January Meeting - Editing

Reasons to edit photographs:

- To <u>correct</u> an image so that it more faithfully represents what you saw
- ▶ To <u>improve</u> an image, remove clutter and irrelevant items, to improve composition
- To <u>alter</u> an image for a specific effect, to create art or envision a potential scene
- To have fun!


January Meeting - Caution

Reasons to be cautious when editing photographs:

- A photograph never lies! Except when it is edited!
- Before you edit a photo think how it will be used, who will see it and why?
- Photos for competitions, news/magazines and articles should only be 'corrected'
- Photos of people can be 'improved'' but don't offend.
- Otherwise go for it!
- Even the esteemed Frank Hurley of the Antarctic expeditions altered images...



Editing - Corrections




Brightness or Exposure and contrast

- Generally, you want your spectrogram to be populated from left (dark) to right (light)
- You don't want 'clipping' to occur, unless you want to create a high or low key effect.
- Altering the contrast will push pixels to the extremes or towards the centre

Editing - Corrections

Colour balance:

- Generally, you want your spectrogram to be populated from left (dark) to right (light)
- You don't want 'clipping' to occur, unless you want to create a high or low key effect.
- Altering the contrast will push pixels to the extremes or towards the centre




Editing - Corrections

Cropping:

- Crop to improve composition
- Crop to remove unwanted items in the image
- Crop to suit the final use, e.g. to fit a frame, magazine cover and even social media

Black and White or Two tone:

- Convert to B&W to emphasise detail
- Boost contrast for a nice edgy shot



Editing - Improvements

Cut and paste, clone tool:

- Remove unwanted distractions, e.g. light switches, exit signs, rubbish on the floor
- Copy textures over unwanted parts, e.g. hedges, wall papers, sky or water

Red eye removal:


- Counteract the effects of direct flash
- Desaturate to whiten eyes and teeth

Editing - Alterations



Go mad but don't offend

- Remove people
- Alter figures
- Add new features, e.g. a badger!



Let's do some editing

There are many editors out there. Start with a free one or trial version and see what works for you.

Options to consider:

- Lightroom and Photoshop probably the best in the business but costs ~£8 per month
- Windows and Mac have versions of 'Photos' included. Quite comprehensive and should suit most
- GIMP a free open-source package that has many features. Might be a bit complex for starters
- There are many others out there. I have not tried them.
